The 2013 Annual Meeting of BFDI, held in July at the Museum of African American History, recognized the stellar outcomes of the 2013 program year with a milestone celebration of 35 years of service to the Detroit community. This rich legacy of delivering high quality services, meeting the needs of the community, embracing results-based accountability, continuously improving performance, and maintaining high levels of consumers, staff and funder satisfaction, gave reason to pause and celebrate.

When Alice G. Thompson, the CEO of BFDI, was asked, "What was significant in advancing the organization's achievement and advancement?"; she simply responded, "Assessing our environment and developing a culture of turning challenges into opportunities."
