

Detroit's Promise Neighborhoods Celebrating Pilot Implementation 2013

2013 Accomplishments:

Enrolled PN families: 57.8% participated in case management, tutoring, summer programming, summer school, after school programs, summer jobs, college entry, sports, mentoring, arts and humanities, music lessons, community safety, classroom support, college bound support, early childhood training, job prep, community capacity-building and community-engagement.

- Data development: Included ETO data system implementation, one year of new data from 2012 baseline (highlights below), signed Master Data Sharing Agreement, pilot programs at Earhart, Maybury and Above and Beyond Learning Early Childcare Center.

5 KEY FINDINGS to Celebrate in 2013

85% of children under 5 in Clark Park and 64% of Reduce household stress and trauma, increase cuddling, children under 5 in Osborn are functioning normally healthy food and *talk, talk, talk, so* children under 5 can in social and emotional growth. (source: ASQ, GSC- grow. W, 2013)

Biggest READING gains:

Students' attendance in Clark Park PN schools (Maybury and Earhart) during the first two months of the year was 83.5%, up from 76.9% last year. (source: DPS, MI databases, 2013)

Encourage and model reading in your home, make it fun, learn together, hook into your child's interest, praise their efforts. Insist on regular attendance.

What Can We Do?

Begin with the basics, drill and play math games, encourage real world connections. Re-teach, reinforce, make it fun, learn together. Help children learn to LOVE math, and unlearn hating math.

Learning and attendance go hand in hand. Keep kids in school. Make it a daily priority. Support and follow up on homework.

Continue to encourage students to work toward graduation and to develop skills to make them successful in college.

Michigan Becomes one of 45 States to Adopt the Common Core

On October 23, 2013 the Michigan Senate passed its version of the House Concurrent Resolution 11, which was adopted by the House in September. This action makes Michigan one of the 45 states to adopt the Common Core State Standards. State Superintendent, Mike Flanagan said, "To help all our students succeed, our collective work needs to be focused on having rigorous standards; effective and valuable assessments those quality aligned to standards; and high and effective educators." Costs for implementing the Smarter Balanced Assessments, set to replace the MEAP, were not approved by the Legislature. The Smarter Balanced Assessment, designed to test the new common core standards, is scheduled to begin in 2014. Stay tuned.

<u>Is Promise Neighborhoods going to continue after this year?</u> Absolutely. We are off to a great start, and our first year results are so strong, that we must continue so that our families are served, our students can build on their successes, and we can begin to scale up to serving more children and families. Next year we will conduct more student, parent, community and school culture surveys, which we will include in our federal application for robust implementation. We will use our lessons learned from this year to inform our work next year, and we will continue to build on our special projects, particularly the ones around community safety, males of color, early childhood development and student achievement. We will continue to build out our comprehensive data system, and continue to implement our pipeline partners into the system. Most importantly we will expand on partner contributions to PN families, as we chart progress going forward. Our impact in the community is already evident. We thank all of our partners for their collaborative efforts during this first year. We are excited to keep it moving.
